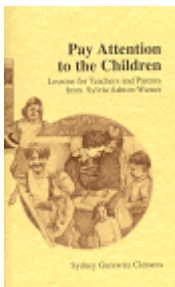

Storytelling is the most ancient of leisure activities, designed for the whole family. Even today timeless classes such as Aesop's Fables, Grimm's Fairytales, and the works of Hans Christian Andersen delight both young and old. Children's author and story time events are free at many bookstores. Storytelling events in museums often include history, art, costume, and theater. All summer long there is free storytelling in Central Park at the Hans Christian Andersen statue, and marionette shows at the Swedish Cottage.

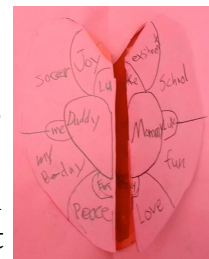

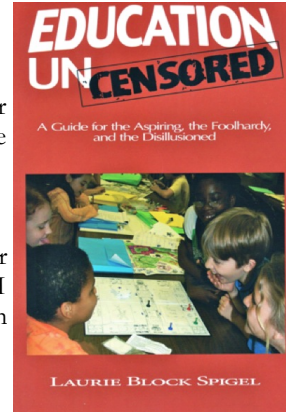
